# Jobs to do in the garden this month



If you have a pond, cover it with netting to catch any falling leaves or debris.

Additionally, remove filters to avoid damage from frost.



Stock up your bird feeders and bird baths, to help migrating and hungry birds



Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring, to help control pests and diseases.



Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already to cultivate the soil.



Prune back blackcurrant leaves, and apple and pear trees to promote stronger growth



Make a shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines (soft fruits) to protect against the cold and peach leaf curl.



Move winter containers into positions of full sun in the garden. Keep watering winter flowering displays.



Inspect stored plants, like Dahlia, Begonia, and Canna's for root rot or drying out to promote healthy growth.



## What to do with your old Christmas Tree?

Here are THREE top tips from our Sooty's staff,

#### Let it rot

Let nature do her thing!

Due to trees being biodegradable, simply cut your tree into sticks and stack them in a shady part of your garden! Not only will it support wildlife, it will also improve soil and nearby plants as it rots.

#### Shred it

If you cannot wait
for the tree to
naturally rot,
shredding is a great
way to speed up
decomposition.
Shredding also makes
for good mulch for
shrubs and paths!

#### Chop it and stack it

If you don't have access to a garden shredder, you can chop the tree up with secateurs, and saw the trunk into short sections. The stacked sections can then be placed around your garden and will slowly disappear, feeding and sheltering wildlife as it decays.

### January Planting/Harvest Guide

January is typically the coldest month of the year - but that doesn't mean nothing can be done within our gardens!

#### **Sow Outdoors**

#### Fruit

 Plant bare-root trees and bushes (As long as the soil is NOT frozen).

#### Vegetables

- Sow broad beans in pots in mild areas, placing them in cold frames or unheated greenhouses.
- Sow seeds indoors for early crops; Like lettuces, cabbages, cauliflowers, turnips, salad onions etc.
- Sow onion seed in a heated propagator.

#### **Pruning**

#### Fruit

- Prune apples, pears, quinces, and medlars.
- Prune currants and gooseberries
- Prune autumn raspberries

#### **Harvest**

#### Vegetables

- Sprouting Broccoli
- Brussels Sprouts
- Jerusalem
   Artichokes
- Leeks
- Parsnips
- Swede
- Celeriac
- Turnips



### January Planting/Harvest Guide

January is typically the coldest month of the year - but that doesn't mean nothing can be done within our gardens!

#### **General maintenance**

#### Fruit

- Keep checking stored fruits and remove rotten ones.
- Ensure tree stakes and ties are firm and sound.
- Harvest citrus fruits once mature.
- Apply a top dressing of sulphate of potash if you have it to all fruits and nuts.

#### Vegetables

- Stake or earth Brussels sprouts that look leggy or vulnerable to wind. Pick large sprouts from the lowest down stalk first.
- Cultivate and prepare seed beds covering them to warm the soil before sowing.
- Add grit if poor drainage of heavy soil.
- Lay down a plank of wood for a walk way over wet soil to avoid compacting the soil.
- Plan a rotation system for vegatable plots to ensure the same crops are not grown in the same beds year after year.
